HELPFUL RESOURCES

Tuition Waivers

- Ask about tuition waivers if you are applying to a community college.

EOPS Program and Support for First-Time Students

- Ask about EOPS and programs for first-time students. These programs often provide new students with mentoring, early registration, and other helpful resources.

Financial Aid & Scholarships

- Financial aid is funding that you can apply for to help with college expenses (tuition, books, supplies, transportation, housing, etc.).
- This funding is provided by federal and state grants or scholarships awarded by your school or outside organizations.
- Scholarships are need or merit based. Learn more about scholarships here: <https://studentaid.ed.gov/sa/types/grants-scholarships/finding-scholarships>
- Your school's financial aid office will process your financial aid application using information from the FAFSA (free application for federal student aid).
- Ask your school's financial aid department about deadlines for your financial aid application. Finish the FAFSA early so that you receive the maximum available funding!

- The first step is to fill out the federal application for student aid (FAFSA) online. This form helps determine your eligibility for grants and scholarships. This information will be sent to schools you indicate on the form.
- Grants and scholarships do not have to be paid back.

WHY GO TO COLLEGE?

Check out the average earnings in 2017 for people 25 years of age and older with different levels of education below.

Doctoral or professional degree	\$110,160
Master's degree	\$76,800
Bachelor's degree	\$78,020
Associate's degree	\$55,870
Postsecondary nondegree award	\$41,520
Some college, no degree	\$37,770
High school diploma or equivalent	\$39,070
No formal educational credential	\$27,510

In addition to higher earnings, unemployment rates tend to be lower as you get more education (i.e., it's easier to find a job).
