Financial Aid & Scholarships

- All of the resources listed here are offered for free or at low cost.
- Once you complete your high school degree, you may be eligible for financial aid, grants, or scholarships to pay for career training programs or community college courses.
- Financial aid is funding that you can apply for to help with <u>college expenses</u> (tuition, books, supplies, transportation, housing, etc.).
- This funding is provided by federal and state grants or scholarships awarded by your school or outside organizations.
- You become eligible for financial aid by filling out the federal application for student aid (FAFSA) online. You can learn more about the FAFSA here: <u>fafsa.gov</u>
- Scholarships are need or merit based. Learn more about scholarships here:

You may need to provide your high school transcript to the program you choose to earn credit for high school classes you already completed. Contact your previous high school and request an Official Transcript.
